

uses narrative writing to facilitate healing among high school aged orphans – survivors
of the 1994 genocide of Tutsi in Rwanda.*

Evelyn Yee-Wai Miu Lee Fong (1944-2003) – This annual training has been named in honor of Evelyn Yee-Wai Miu Lee Fong, Ed.D., L.C.S.W., who was widely respected in the mental health field and the Asian American community, as a clinician, administrator, teacher, author, community advocate, and humanitarian. Dr. Lee served as Executive Director of RAMS, Inc. (1990-2003) as well as a Clinical Professor of Psychiatry at UCSF, Vice President for the Board of National Asian American Pacific Islander Mental Health Association (NAAPIMHA), and was invited to the first-ever White House Conference on Mental Health. She received numerous community service and teaching awards throughout her career, in recognition for foresight and innovation in the mental health field.
